Amber's family moved to the area in 2022. Her Mam and Dad are from different countries. She has 3 younger brothers or sisters and one older half-brother. No one from social care had worked with the family before.

#### Recommendations

- Use national reforms to Improve local services:
- i) Work together using a clear system.
- ii) Share information early and ask questions.
- iii) Use helpful language about consent.
- iv) Make sure out-of-hours services work like daytime ones.
- 2. Check and improve out-ofhours call systems so professionals talk quickly and clearly.
- 3. Update training and guidance to help with language and consent.
- 4. Add training about cultural confidence for all workers.

Main ideas

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- Know what makes children at risk.
- Share information early and use clear language.
- Be confident about cultural differences.
- Make sure children are safe even outside normal working hours.

Things that made life harder

- Adults who need help might also be parents. We must think about their children's safety.
- Needing help to care for the children from family or friends.
- Family culture, community, and support networks.

What we can Learn

- Understand family life better, including money, culture, and relationships.
- Be confident when working with different cultures.
- Talk clearly about consent and ask, 'How can we help?'
